St. Ita's School has been founded with the object of attempting for Irish Purpose and girls what has been so successfully attempted by St. Enda's Scope of School. It will provide a primary and secondary education, Irish in tone and bilingual in method, under careful domestic arrangements and in beautiful and healthy surroundings.

Cullenswood House, the original home of St. Enda's, with its spacious grounds, classrooms, and dormitories, available for the housing of St. Ita's. Cullenswood House is situated in the healthiest part of the southern suburbs of Dublin. The grounds, which command a delightful view of the Dublin Mountains, include a tennis lawn, a beautiful flower garden with vinery and conservatories, a vegetable garden, a well-stocked orchard, a playing-field, and an open-air gymnasium. The house is large and the rooms spacious and airy. The girls' quarters will comprise a study hall, five classrooms, a gymnasium, a library, a chapel, three dormitories, an infirmary, bathrooms, lavatories, etc.

THE School will maintain that private and homelike character which has made St. Enda's so beloved by its pupils.

Religious fraining.

will endeavour to ground its pupils in sound moral and religious principles, to train them in practical Christianity, and to awaken in them a spirit of patriotism and a sense of duty and obligation to their country. Religious instruction will be under the superintendence of a Chaplain approved by His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin. The boarders will attend daily Mass, and a Guild of the Apostleship of Prayer and of the Archconfraternity of the Sacred Heart will be formed in connection with the local Church of the Holy Name, Cullenswood. Younger pupils will be prepared for first Confession, first Holy Communion, and Confirmation.

CAREFUL attention will be paid to the health and physical development of the girls. Ample provision will be made for open-air exercise and games.

Besides Irish, which will be the official language of the School, the course of studies will embrace Christian Doctrine and Sacred History (under the direction of the School Chaplain), Irish and General History, English, French, German, Classics, Mathematics, Natural Science, Geography, Domestic Economy and Hygiene, Needlework, Drawing, Painting, Vocal and Instrumental Music, Dancing, and Physical Drill.

From the foregoing subjects a suitable course will be selected for each pupil. Plain Cookery, Needlework, Physical Drill, and Irish Dancing will be taught to all pupils, unless parents or guardians desire otherwise. Every care will be taken to instil habits of order, neatness, and punctuality in the girls. They will be taught to mend their own clothes, to make their own beds, and to dust and keep tidy their apartments and belongings.

The curriculum in the higher forms will be co-ordinated with that of the Universities, and classes will be prepared each year for the Matriculation Examination of the National University of Ireland. A limited number of girls attending the National University lectures will be accommodated and receive tuition in the School. At the end of each Term examinations will be conducted by a board of examiners appointed by the School, the results of which will be forwarded to parents and guardians.

THE PREPARATORY DAY SCHOOL FOR YOUNG BOYS which was one of the Preparatory features of St. Enda's will be continued under the supervision of the class mistresses of St. Ita's, assisted by a primary mistress.

THERE will be one annual School Term divided into Autumn, Christmas and

Terms. Easter Sessions. The School Term will open each year in the
first week of September and close in the third week of June.

A vacation of three weeks will be given at Christmas, and a vacation of ten
days at Easter. Pupils will be expected to be in their places on the first day
of re-opening after vacation. New pupils will be admitted at any time during

the year, and the Fee charged will be strictly pro rata. Three months' notice, or three months' pension, will be required in the case of the removal of a Boarder during term.

ALL Fees are payable in advance, but for the convenience of parents the annual pension may be paid in two equal instalments, on Fees. September 1st and on February 1st respectively. The Fees are as follows :-

BOARDERS may remain at School during vacation on terms to be arranged with the House Mistress. THE meals for Boarders will consist of breakfast, light lunch at mid-day, dinner (two or three courses), and supper.

Day Pupils will be provided with a milk and bread-and-butter lunch at mid-day for an extra charge of 12s. 6d. per quarter. Day Pupils living at a distance can join the Boarders at dinner for an extra charge of £2 2s. per quarter. Day Pupils can return to school in the afternoon for study or recreation with the Boarders for an extra charge of 7s. 61. per quarter.

Outfit for Boarders.

A List of the articles required will be forwarded on application. Each article should be plainly marked with the full name of the owner. An inventory of the articles composing the outfit should be gummed inside the lid of the girl's trunk.

All clothes and other articles are to be, as far as possible, of Irish material and manufacture. THE School Hat with School Ribbon will be supplied to Boarders on entrance.
